## Blog / moving from aws to montaigne

In an effort to limit my usage of Amazon, I've moved my resume site to a tool called [Montaigne](#).

The reason I chose this tool is because I'm also focusing on removing friction in my writing. I've been on the "Just use Apple Notes" train for a while and found [ForeverNotes](#)... which, without disparaging the system or the people who love it, was just too complex for me.

Yes, I found a way to over-engineer my note-taking process - it's possible even in Apple Notes. I tried the daily note for about 6 months, hubs for work, music, workouts, etc... but then I found myself skipping the daily note and just typing free-form Quick Notes when I needed to.

So now, Apple Notes is my stream-lined journaling and knowledge capturing app. Through a series of shortcuts and audio transcriptions to notes, I've made note-taking almost effortless.

Which brings me to my resume website - I don't want to give more money to Amazon then I have to AND want a frictionless way to update my site (and share the occasional blog post).

Montaigne allows me to create a fully functional site within my Apple Notes and is *actually as easy as it says*.

I transferred my AWS Route 53 domain to [porkbun](#) and will be supporting the Montaigne developer by requesting my site go to this custom domain.

I'll keep updating this note as my journey continues and will create a few how-tos eventually.
